Course Title: HuBi 2004– Fundamentals of Molecular Biology

Course Schedule: 1:00-1:50pm Mon•Tues•Thurs.

Course Description: HuBi 2004 Fundamentals of Molecular Biology will introduce the mechanisms by which genomic information is stored and expressed; and how expression is regulated. Topics will include nucleic acid structures, DNA replication, RNA transcription and splicing, and how proteins are synthesized. Molecular biological techniques, their applications to biotechnology used in the advancement of food and drug development, and the implications for modern living will be discussed

Qualifications: An M.Sc. with a research focus in an area of molecular biology and genetics is required. Applicants who have completed a PhD are preferred. Familiarity with teaching this subject matter is an asset.
