Our Mission



Introducing Our Pillars

The activities at ARC-NL are organized by three research pillars to create and support research on topics covering the spectrum of aging.

Biology of Aging

The goal of this pillar is to research the aging process and age-related diseases from a biological standpoint with the aim of promoting health and a better quality of life.

Pillar Co-Leads: Dr. Karen Doody (Environmental Science, Grenfell Campus) and Dr. Sukhinder Cheema (Biochemistry, St. John's Campus)

Lived Experience of Aging

This pillar aims to improve the health and quality of life of older adults with cognitive and mental health issues, promote recognition of the diversity of older adults, encourage positive well-being, and develop inventions for healthier aging.

Pillar Lead: Dr. Kelly Warren (Psychology, Grenfell Campus)

Aging in Place

This pillar is centered around supporting older adults as they age at home and in their communities. It examines the impact of age-friendly policy and programming and engages in community-based research.

Pillar Co-Leads: Dawn Pittman (Western Regional School of Nursing, Grenfell Campus) and Dr. Kelly Vodden (Environmental Policy Institute, Grenfell Campus)

Age-Friendly Communities

Dawn Pittman, a co-lead of the ARC-NL Aging in Place pillar, led a research project on Age-Friendly Communities in partnership with communities in the Great Northern Peninsula (GNP) and the GNP Research Collective. The project identified research priorities for Age-Friendly Communities in the region, inspired new projects, and will serve as a template for future projects in other regions.

ARC-NL has also been working with other communities such as The St. George's Indian Band and Benoit First Nation (Community garden event, pictured right) to identify partner opportunities for 2024-25, including expanding our age-friendly communities survey.
