

PRE-CLERKSHIP

The first iteration of the new Phase 1 Community Engagement Course, **Early Clinical Experience**, was a resounding success. The students rated this component of Phase 1 the highest of all of the course components. We are deeply grateful to our community preceptors for their cooperation in making themselves and their clinics available on Wednesday afternoons in the fall. We will be sending out a request for placements in September-November 2017 shortly.

The **Rural/Community Visit** has returned to the spring time slot it occupied in the old curriculum. The assessment scheme was updated to reflect Phase 2 objectives and to reduce the workbook requirements. Unfortunately, we were not able to find enough spaces for all of the students to experience a rural visit, so a small number of students were placed in urban practices.

The **Black Bag** course remains in its late spring time slot and is well-received by the students. This course is an excellent opportunity for students to hone their history and physical assessment skills just before they launch into clerkship. Their skills as clinicians are developing at this point and they are very enthusiastic about practicing their skills in the real world.

We sincerely extend a huge thank you to all of our devoted preceptors for their dedication to teaching and assessing our learners. We appreciate your dedication as well as your feedback.



CARMS 2017 – RESIDENCY POSITIONS

Thirty-five residency positions were offered in CaRMS for a July 1, 2017 start date. These thirty-five positions were distributed throughout the training streams: 13 Eastern, 6 Central, 6 Western, 6 Northern-Goose Bay and 4 Northern-Nunavut. Three hundred and four candidate files were reviewed and two hundred and forty-four prospective residents were interviewed!

Family Medicine representatives from all of the training streams were involved with CaRMS – from candidate interviews and lunch time presentations to the final candidate rank lists. Thanks to everyone for their help.

CURRICULUM

The curriculum focus this past year has been on curriculum review and supporting streams with their initiatives.

The Eastern Stream had a successful Resident Retreat and looks ahead to the next academic year as additional longitudinal Family Medicine training experiences are piloted. The Central Stream held resident retreats and continues to build on the Behavioural Medicine curriculum for their residents. The Western Stream offers the Counselling Centre curriculum locally and now looks to expand teaching to cover other Behavioural Medicine topics. In addition, a number of new first year Academic Family Medicine training sites started taking residents. Western Stream residents also enjoyed their resident retreat. The Northern-Goose Bay residents have benefited from local teaching that includes Behavioural Medicine, Practice Management and Academic Half Day content. The Northern-Nunavut Stream has started delivering Academic Half Day sessions locally.

ASSESSMENT, EVALUATION AND PROMOTIONS

The Assessment, Evaluation and Promotions Committee reviews resident files and makes recommendations about progress to the Residency Training Committee. All methods of resident assessment are taken into consideration (E.g. field notes, ITERs, Academic Half Day presentations, EBM and Behavioural Medicine presentation feedback, Resident Forum feedback and successful course completion). The Committee is also responsible for assessment and evaluation tools and for resident remediation. The Stream Assessment and Evaluation Leads sit on this committee.

This year the committee focused on creating integrated longitudinal ITERs.

ACCREDITATION

In September, the CFPC Accreditation team reviewed the residency program. It was a busy week for all involved and a huge thanks to all who were involved leading up to the visit and during the Accreditation week. We are happy to report that the overarching program received the status of 'Accredited Program with an External Review to be conducted within 24 months' and the Enhanced Skills program received the status of 'Accredited Program with a College-mandated Internal Review to be conducted within 18 months'.





Family Medicine-Emergency Medicine:

6 residents completed the FM-EM enhanced skills year on June 30, 2017.



ENHANCED SKILLS TRAINING PROGRAMS

The FM-EM program continues to be a successful adjunct to the core Family Medicine Post Graduate Program. This program matches 6 residents through CaRMS each fall for a July 1st start and remains very popular across the country. The FM-EM residents and faculty contribute to both clinical and formal teaching of the Family Medicine Residents.

The six month Care of Elderly Enhanced Skills has started! Two residents completed the program this year. We look forward to continuing to offer enhanced care of elderly training.

The Care of Underserved Populations Enhanced Skills program started in July 2017. This program aims to increase knowledge and practical experience of the special care needs and considerations of both local and global underserved populations.

ENHANCED SKILLS PROGRAM - CARE OF THE ELDERLY

The first two graduates have completed of the Care of the Elderly Program as of January 2017 and are actively engaged in geriatric care in the community. A Certificate of Added Competence from the CFPC has been awarded to both graduates. This program is directed towards care of the frail elderly in the context of care of seniors generally and towards preventing frailty. Residents are encouraged to enhance their administrative skills in long-term care geriatric medicine. They will undertake training in geriatric assessments and consults, geriatric rehabilitation, geriatric psychiatry, family medicine geriatrics, ambulatory care, outreach and longitudinal geriatric clinics with opportunities in research, house calls, community visits and work with the Alzheimer's Society.

Two applicants have been interviewed for this year's program by Dr. Roger Butler the Program Director, and the Care of the Elderly committee members. The committee includes Dr. Susan Mercer, a MUN Family Medicine graduate who has completed further training in Care of the Elderly, and assisted in the development and ongoing work of the program. One candidate has been chosen for the program and will commence training in September 2017. The program is being promoted widely and the hope is for a second trainee to start the program in the new year. Training will take place over six months at the Leonard A. Miller Centre and Waterford sites as well as one four-week block in Saint John, New Brunswick, and one block in Botwood.


Our Family Medicine Program offers the opportunity to complete a third year of enhanced skills training in Emergency Medicine. It is designed to provide family physicians with the complex skill set necessary to practice Emergency Medicine in any setting. Applicants must either be enrolled in an accredited Family Medicine Residency Training Program in Canada, or be in practice and hold certification with the College of Family Physicians of Canada to be eligible to apply.

The objectives of the emergency medicine enhanced skills program are to:

- Train family physicians to the high level of competence and confidence necessary to practice emergency medicine in urban, rural or remote communities.
- Enable family physicians to take a leading role in the administration of emergency services in the community.
- Provide a formal teaching setting to prepare trainees to successfully sit the Examination of Special Competence in Emergency Medicine.

The resident quota for 2017-18 is 6 residents. Both locally and nationally, the FM-EM program continues to be very popular; there were 100 applicants last year.

Residents complete rotations in Adult Emergency Medicine (5 blocks), Pediatric Emergency Medicine, Coronary Care, Intensive Care (2 blocks), Plastic Surgery, Anesthesia, Rural Emergency Medicine and an elective block. Both rural EM and anaesthesia are offered in Grand Falls-Windsor. The Pediatric rotation will now be completed at the Janeway Children's Hospital; residents will no longer have to travel to London, Ontario.

ENHANCED SKILLS PROGRAM - CARE OF UNDERSERVED POPULATIONS

The Care of Underserved Populations (CUP) Enhanced Skills program has secured funding for its first resident to start in the summer of 2017. This program will provide resident opportunity to engage in health equity issues among domestic and international populations. This twelve-month program will include 5.5 months in downtown St. John's, 4.5 months in Sheshatshiu, Labrador, and 2 months in a developing country.

Competencies in CUP have been developed, along with four key learning topics:

- Community and transdisciplinary engagement in scholarly projects
- Advocacy within health systems for underserved populations
- Social determinants of health in domestic and international settings
- Patient care balancing evidence and resource-based approaches

This program includes clinical care, but intentionally focuses on issues of sustainability and capacity building by engaging residents, transdisciplinary partners, and community in education and scholarship. To this end, various partnerships in different contexts are underway, including collaboration with the Labrador Institute on a longitudinal patient-oriented research project that CUP residents will invest in at various stages over the years. EASTFAM

Streams Lead DR. SONNY COLLIS

The Eastern stream continues providing excellent clinical training for its residents.

The current academic year sees 13 new residents begin training for the 2017- 2019 program. They begin with only minor changes to the academic structure to their program. All of our incoming residents are current graduates of Memorial Medical School. We look forward to their training in the upcoming two years and wish our best to the outgoing residents as they embark on their future careers.

There have been a few staff changes over this year. Unfortunately we see the departure of Dr. David Brentnall of Clarenville as he moves on to other opportunities. We wish him the best in his future endeavours and we hope to see him again in the future. Dr. Megan Hayes has stepped down as Research and EBM Lead for Eastern Stream but remains on as a rural preceptor. But with these losses we see the gain of two new rural preceptors Dr. Emily Godec in Clarenville and Dr. Michelle Kennedy in Upper Island Cove. It is great to see such interest in resident training.

Dr. Chris Patey from Carbonear has also joined our faculty as a rural full-time faculty member this fall. We welcome him aboard.

The Eastern Stream held a two-day Academic Workshop and Wellness Retreat on May 12 and 13, 2017 for both first and second year Eastern Stream residents. The retreat offered workshops based on resident requested practical skills and competencies to supplement their residency training and a hike and "boil-up" to promote health and wellness of our future family physicians.

The academic component included a Procedures workshop with Dr. Ean Parsons and Dr. Sonny Collis; a Practice Management Workshop on Managing Paperwork by Dr. Sonny Collis with presentations from guest speakers Mr. Glenn Roebothan from Roebothan, McKay, and Marshall and Dr. Terry Fogwell of workplaceNL; and a radiology presentation by Drs. Lisa Smyth, Paul Jeon and Ravi Gullipalli. The day concluded with a guided, hands-on workshop on casting and splinting techniques with orthopedic resident Dr. Chris Small. The program received quite positive evaluations. There will definitely be further retreats in the future and we plan to have retreats twice a year supplementing the academic component of the program and to promote teamwork and wellness in our residents. The current plan is to host the fall retreat in a rural site. A rural retreat raises many funding challenges but there is a lot of interest so our fingers are crossed.

We remain challenged with obstetrical resources in our province. A small pilot project with our local Family Medicine Obstetrical group hopes to help fill some gaps. This project will see three residents complete one month of their obstetrical goals concurrently with their rotation in academic family medicine. Currently they will complete the second month in a traditional block specialist rotation but other options are still being explored. This is a potential new model for our training that may see further options in the future. Two other pilot projects in the same model are going ahead for 2017-2018. The first is a combined concurrent PGY1 rotation in academic family medicine, care of the elderly and palliative care at the Ross center for a full 6 block rotation. The second pilot for three residents combines academic family medicine with each of adult emergency, pediatrics emergency and pediatrics clinics. This is a scheduling study to see what is possible and what issues will arise. We limited this to three residents total for this academic year.

The challenge going forward for the next 2018-2020 academic program is to revamp the entire rotation and academic schedule to match the concepts of longitudinal and continuity in clinical training. This is no longer a concept but is now considered the way forward in postgraduate teaching. Many models are being explored and draft working template for both PGY1 and PGY2 should be ready in the next few weeks. This template will then need to go through a round of consultations with the current academic stakeholders both urban and rural to make a firm plan for implementation for June 2018. There will be many challenges with this as it will require a change in thinking of how we currently educate our residents and it will require a lot of creative solutions. I have no doubt though that we will end up with a great final product. There is a lot of interest and talent in our current faculty and they all have the same goal of excellence in clinical training in mind.

CenFam, the Central Stream, offers five teachings sites: Botwood, Twillingate, Grand Falls-Windsor, Gander and Baie Verte with four of them active – Botwood, Twillingate, Grand Falls-Windsor and Gander. CenFam continues to offer training to five first year residents and six second year residents: 2 R1s and 2 R2s in Grand Falls-Windsor, 1 R1 and 2 R2s in Botwood, 1 R2 in Gander and 2 R1s and 1 R2 in Twillingate. In addition to this, we have three first year Nunavut residents who will work in one of the CenFam sites at some point in their year.

Behavioural Medicine and Counselling Curriculum sessions were delivered via Telehealth devices at each of the core sites from staff in Grand Falls-Windsor. Leads for this project were Dr. Kris Luscombe (Psychiatry) and Dr. Tracey Scott (Psychology). All sessions were delivered by psychiatry, psychology and mental health counsellors. Two full-day retreats in Grand Falls-Windsor combined the R1s and R2s to offer the curriculum. In addition to these retreats, both the R1s and the R2s participated in six curriculum sessions and 6 half-day sessions each.

In Botwood, Wednesday mornings are resident teachings where learners prepare topics and teach each other or they are presented a specific topic by a preceptor. This can include SOO practice or procedures. Thursday mornings are teaching rounds where staff or trainees present a topic for the team to review and when schedules allow, students meet as a group monthly to complete a McMaster PBGL.

On the afternoon of March 30th, a SOO workshop/mock exam took place in Grand Falls-Windsor for all the R2s. We continue with our scheduled weekly lectures for the GFW learners/residents in Surgery, IM, OBS/ GYNE, Psychiatry, Family and Emergency Medicine. Plans are in place to provide these teachings to the entire region via videoconference starting in September 2017.

Dr. Andrew Hunt in Twillingate has done individual research/audit projects with the R1 residents from the Central site during their academic family medicine rotation.

Two resident educational retreat days have taken place over the past year. In September 2016 all residents gathered in Botwood to take part in a PBL session and SOO workshop. The afternoon ended off with a tour of the Botwood Air Museum. In February 2017, all residents came together in Grand Falls-Windsor for a two-day retreat. This retreat included the Behavioural Medicine curriculum the first day and then covered Palliative Care Pearls, Concussion Management and Choosing Radiology Tests Wisely the following morning. This retreat moved into an afternoon of snowshoeing and a boil-up and concluded with an evening of curling sponsored by the Town of Grand Falls-Windsor. Our next 1-day retreat is already planned for Twillingate this September. We have an educational morning planned and are looking forward to a boat tour in the afternoon (fingers crossed the weather cooperates)!

NORFAM

We are in the 2nd year of longitudinal integrated family medicine residency with the arrival of 6 new first year residents in July 2016.

Premed Summer Institute

This initiative is one of our medical school's contribution to the social accountability mandate. We had 4 Indigenous undergrad students who are considering medicine as a potential career and preparing them for entry to medical school.

Staff Changes

We have a new academic program administrator, Kathryn Wedgwood who was appointed for one year. Besides helping with the administration of the program she has past experience with assisting in research.

We will be losing Dr. Margo Wilson to the Department of Emergency in St. John's in July of 2017.

Simulation and Telehealth

We have moved our simulation equipment to the new academic space. We continue to provide training via high-fidelity simulation. We are investigating new modalities of simulation including integrating ultrasound in simulated rural critical care. We continue to train our residents on leading resuscitation via robotic remote presence. This is unique in Canada and likely globally. We show cased robotic telemedicine in Greenland and UBC-north and have been invited to an IT expo in Toronto.

Innovations

We experimented successfully with 3D printing in a Labrador tent in the winter. We added an extra dimension to training in Indigenous health through camping out on the land with the Innu for their week-long retreat in the bush. The medical students conducted a research project on the importance of living in the country and relationship with diabetes. We have committed to the Innu leaders to participate in their next retreat.

Our faculty continues to participate in research. The list is as below:

NunaFam continues on as part of the Northern stream of training with four second year residents training for six months in the territory for 2016-2017, and another four matching for the 2017 academic year. The trainees continue to be based in Iqaluit in the recently renovated Qikiqtani Hospital, and are assigned an outlying community where they conduct clinics and for continuity follow these patients under the supervision of their main preceptor. For the 2016-17 academic year, Dr. Sarah Lesperance took on the medical education lead role while Dr. Madeleine Cole is on sabbatical.

Residents continue to learn all aspects of practicing full scope family medicine in remote, isolated environments while developing cultural competency to help them work more effectively with indigenous communities. In addition to clinical skills, within NunaFam, there is an emphasis on health advocacy, public health and preventative medicine. The two Memorial graduates who signed long term contracts with Nunavut continue to live and work in the territory. According to executive leads and faculty on-site, the number of full time physicians in Nunavut is at the highest level it has been in the past five years. Nunavut is now viewed as a center of medical education and not just a clinical experience. This is an asset to recruitment as for those considering practice in the territory, the academic link with Memorial offers the opportunity to include educational/research work in their career. In addition to this success, we have also progressed the plan to promote medical education as a career option to Indigenous students, and two high school students from the community of Kugluktuk have been accepted to the Healers of Tomorrow Gathering health careers camp. The camp, which is offered through the Aboriginal Health Initiative in the Faculty of Medicine, took place August 13th-20th at Grenfell campus and will include a hands-on program which will offer the students exposure to the many different health career professions, and will highlight both Western and Indigenous views of health and well-being.

GFT FACULTY CLINICAL ACTIVITY IN 2016/17

The Clinical Management Committee continued to develop our clinical activities as we strive to build our patient's medical home model (PMH) in innovative ways in our four academic teaching units. This year the unit directors repeated the PMH Self-Assessment Tool through the CFPC to see where we have become more aligned with the PMH and where we still have challenges.

Our interprofessional teams continue to develop and become a standard part of our operations. Nurse Practitioners in our clinics show us the varied ways these positions can benefit our teams from clinical care of the elderly and developmentally disabled, to care of refugees. Collaboration with pharmacists in our clinics as well as long term care is well established, as is our work with David Craig and the psychiatry residents modeling a shared care approach. Interprofessional education in our clinics continues with pharmacy, nurse practitioner and kinesiology students.

Patient Advisory Councils (PAC) are one of the important components of the Patient Medical Home. They bring patient perspective to clinic policies and practices and are proposed to improve the care experience. Our PAC really found its stride this year, meeting monthly with at least one of the Clinic Directors and Barb Morrissey or Fronie Squibb in attendance. The CFPC noted the success of our PAC as they came to document the process in film. Members of the PAC were interviewed for a series of videos on the patients' perspective in the PMH. The final series of 4 videos is posted on the CFPC Patient Medical Home website at http://patientsmedicalhome.ca/resources/the-patients-perspective/. In addition, the PAC undertook a survey to characterize the current patient population at the St. John's academic teaching units, ask for feedback on their experience in their respective clinics and to solicit suggestions to improve services. Preliminary survey results were presented this year at PriFor by patient members of the PAC.

Working closely with the Newfoundland and Labrador Medical Association (NLMA), we have benefitted from the services provided through the "same day access" initiative. This year the Family Practice Unit teams attended the day long workshop, while the Shea Heights and Ross Centre teams continue to review various clinical processes on a regular basis to improve the patient's clinical experience. Another liaison with the NLMA this year has been in regards to its Family Practice Renewal Program. The program, which is

governed jointly by the NLMA and the Department of Health (DoH), has a mandate to design new programs and initiatives in regards to the evolution of the physician role in primary health care in the province. We anticipate continuing the conversation with a plan to become involved in the program's new regional Family Practice Networks. A number of GFT faculty in the DFM have also been a part of the DoH's Primary Health Care Advisory Committee.

Our clinics continue to look at ways to improve. As part of our evidenced based medicine (EBM) teaching, residents take on several quality improvement (QI) initiatives during the year to look at our current practices on how we deliver care to our patients and feed that information back to the providers in the clinic. As well, our clinics are actively participating in the provincial Choosing Wisely campaign which is aimed at helping clinicians and patients engage in conversations about unnecessary tests, treatments and procedures. This will continue to be a focus going forward.

Another project currently being led by Dr. Michele Levy for the Discipline is one related to afterhours care for our patients. The project, funded in part through the NLMAs Clinic Stabilization Fund, conducted a patient survey to obtain patient input as well as gathered information about the current services available for afterhours care in the City. Our Academic clinics currently provide a 7 day a week on call service to our patients who required afterhours urgent care. We will look to use the information learned from this project to help inform our decision making going forward.

It's been ten years since our St. John's academic sites became early adopters of electronic medical records (EMR) technology; using Wolf EMR for all patient encounters. This past year, the NLMA the Dept. of Health & Community Services and NL and Labrador Centre for Health Information (NLCHI) have begun to deliver a provincial EMR program. The program is called eDOCSNL and the provincially selected software is known as MedAccess. Based on a recent needs assessment, our clinics have decided we will look to transition our current EMR to MedAccess, We anticipate this transition will occur over the next year.

The Discipline continues to work with the Faculty of Medicine, the Dept. of Health and Eastern Health to secure improved space for our patients and teaching program at the Health Sciences Centre site. This effort has proven to be a significant challenge due to space and budget restraints. We continue to be optimistic that a solution to our space challenges will be forthcoming this year. We look forward to working with our partners in this regard.

There are currently eleven GFT faculty members attached to this unit: Drs. Pauline Duke, Vina Broderick, Scott Moffatt, Heather Flynn, Pamela Snow, Ean Parsons, Wanda Parsons, Gerard Farrell, Andrew Smith, Kris Aubrey & Russell Dawe. Dr. Gerard Farrell joined the team in September, 2015 and provides cancer care follow up services for our patients and for those referred from physicians in the community. Dr. Petra Joller continued as a clinical associate. Dr. JM Gamble and Dr. Erin Davis from the Faculty of Pharmacy are clinical pharmacist members on each team. Kari Brown is the full time Nurse Practitioner working with our Refugee Health Clinic. Dr. Andrew Smith is also the primary physician for the Ferryland Clinic providing clinical care in conjunction with a nurse practitioner.

This site has two group practices (Team 1 and Team 2), and cares for nearly 5,000 patients ranging from birth to over 100 years of age. In the past academic year, 25 resident months of supervision and teaching occurred at this site in addition to many medical students, nurse practitioner students, kinesiology students and pharmacy students.

There continues to be several initiatives that are unique to the Family Practice Unit/Family Medicine Clinic at the Health Sciences Centre (HSC) site:

- MUN Med Gateway Project The MUN Med Gateway Project which began in 2005- 2006, continues to thrive under the leadership of Dr. Pauline Duke is the lead physician involved. The project partners with the Association for New Canadians (ANC), the settlement agency for the Province and Eastern Health (through the ANC public health nurse). The main goals of the project are to train medical students in cross-cultural medicine and engage them in community action while improving access to healthcare for refugees in Newfoundland. This program has expanded from history taking to evidence-based screening (e.g. dental, hearing, vision, etc.).
- 2. Refugee well woman clinics Arising out of a need to increase access to woman's health examinations, this program began in 2012 and continues to provide this care in a culturally sensitive manner.
- 3. Prenatal group clinics –The St. John's based clinic gives patients the opportunity to meet all the involved family physicians at their prenatal visits in the last month of their pregnancy prior to their delivery. The

physicians are Susan Avery, Norah Duggan, Amanda Pendergast, Jessica Bishop and Kelly Monaghan. These physicians also covered Case Room call for the Obstetrics Department during the OB/GYN resident half day on Friday afternoons. Family medicine residents are involved in all aspects of the Family Centered Maternity Care clinic.

- 4. Care for specific out of town populations This site provides family medicine care to families of: 1) children hospitalized at the Janeway Hospital (e.g. NICU); and 2) Bliss Murphy Cancer Centre patients if they are from elsewhere in the Province outside St. John's.
- 5. Participation in patient care at the Miller Centre Dr. Ean Parsons participates in the in-patient ward, Russell Dawe, Palliative Care Consult, Michelle Levey and Amanda Tzenov, Veteran's Pavilion
- 6. Participation in Palliative Care Service Dr. Russell Dawe participates in the Palliative Care consultation service.
- 7. Sports medicine referrals Dr. Ean Parsons is a certified sports medicine physician who provides sports medicine consultations.
- 8. Acupuncture Dr. Heather Flynn is certified to perform acupuncture, and provides acupuncture consultations and therapy.
- 9. 24-hour ambulatory blood pressure monitoring This site provides 24-hour ambulatory blood pressure monitoring for patients at all St. John's based academic teaching sites.
- 10. Refugee Health Clinic A dedicated Refugee Health Clinic operates from the Family Practice Unit with clinical care provided by Drs. Christine Bassler, Pauline Duke & Petra Joller. Kari Brown joined the team as a full time Nurse Practitioner in August 2016. Family medicine residents are involved in the Refugee Health clinic in providing initial comprehensive assessments and care and follow up under supervision. Intrapartum care for refugee women is provided by our Family Centered Maternity Care group. Liaison with settlement workers, social workers, public health nurse, ESL teachers and the settlement agency who specifically work with refugees has been ongoing for some years. Further enhancements included more formal liaison with infectious disease specialists (adult and child), public health, and pediatrics. Our clinical pharmacist regularly provides expert clinical advice to the Refugee Clinic.

There are currently three GFT faculty members, Dr. Danielle O'Keefe, Dr. Stephen Lee and Dr. Jessica Bishop. In addition to the faculty members, we have two part-time physicians with busy practices. Dr. Christine Aubrey-Bassler has been with the clinic since its opening and is now significantly involved with the Refugee Health program bringing many new refugee families into the practice. This adds to the diversity of our practice and will help our residents learn about refugee health issues. Many of these new patients do not speak English and the translation services of CanTalk are used extensively in the clinic. Dr. Lynn Dwyer join the team last year as a part-time physician; and most recently has taken on the leadership role of President of the Newfoundland and Labrador Medical Association. We look forward to the valuable contribution she will make during her term as President.

The Torbay Road Clinic has over 2,500 patients registered. We have a diverse patient population and a good spectrum of patients with all age groups represented in similar proportions to our other teaching sites in St. John's. Our residents have a busy comprehensive experience at Torbay Road. Our clinic usually has two Family Medicine residents and we welcome medical students at various levels of training on a regular basis. The clinic is also utilized on Thursday mornings by Dr. Russell Dawe to do practice videos for medical students and residents completing palliative care rotations. The Standardized Patient Program is integral to the success of this endeavor.

In January 2017, the Family Centered Maternity Care group, moved its weekly prenatal clinic to Torbay Road Mall This clinic adds an excellent opportunity for our residents. Dr. Jessica Bishop from our clinic is one of fseveral family medicine physicians on that team.

We look forward to working with new learners from the Faculty of Medicine and allied faculties in the 2017-2018 academic year!

There are currently four GFT faculty members working in this unit including Dr. Roger Butler, Dr. Michelle Levy, Dr. Katherine Stringer, and Dr. Gary Tarrant. We are pleased that Dr. Amanda Tzenov will be staying at the Ross Centre, becoming a GFT faculty in July 2017. Amanda joined the unit in 2015 as a locum family physician covering first Dr. Tarrant's and then Dr. Butler's sabbaticals. Dr. Erin Bennett continues as a part time physician providing patient care and supervising learners. Denise Cahill is a Nurse Practitioner who works full-time in the unit and Dr. Carla Dillon is the Pharmacist, cross-appointed to the Discipline from the School of Pharmacy. LPN Maureen Pike retired in May 2017. Thanks to Maureen for her work in the clinic and her years of service to Eastern Health. We are happy to welcome Tina Tulk to the Ross Centre to the LPN position.

As a core academic teaching unit for the DFM, the Ross Centre has learners from a variety of levels. There is a 6 month rotation for four PGY1s composed of integrated Academic family medicine / Palliative Care / Care of the Elderly. There are also PGY2s for their Care of Elderly (COE) rotations. Other learners include 1st year medical students, clerkship students and elective students. An Interprofessional Educational experience is provided by including Nurse Practitioner (NP) students under the supervision of Denise Cahill (NP) & Pharmacy students under the supervision of Carla Dillon (Pharmacist). This past year, with the inaugural year of the COE enhanced skills program, we had two PGY3s at the clinic for parts of their rotations. We look forward to this continuing to grow.

There are several clinical initiatives that are unique to the Ross Family Medicine Centre:

- Care of in-patients at the Dr. L. A. Miller Centre Drs. Butler (Dr. Tzenov during his sabbatical) and Levy contribute to the care of in-patients at the Dr. L. A. Miller Centre where they manage a medical ward in the Caribou Memorial Veteran's Pavilion. They, along with Dr. Stringer, also provide on-call coverage for the Miller Centre.
- 2. Care of Personal Care Homes Dr. Tarrant currently supervises the care of residents of three personal care homes in the Goulds.
- 3. Nurse Practitioner NP Denise Cahill plays a major role in house call visitation and currently has over fifty home visits on her regular rotation. She also takes the lead in chronic disease management and has clinics which focus especially on the chronic care for patients with diabetes mellitus.

- Geriatric Assessments Dr. Butler is involved in geriatric assessments including patients referred from outside the practice and in the last two years was involved with the establishment of Community Rapid Response Team for elderly patients in the ER who do not have a family doctor. This program will now find a permanent home under the Homefirst umbrella within Eastern Health. We are very pleased to see this much-needed service find a permanent home.
- 2. Psychotherapy Dr. Tarrant is involved with psychotherapy treatment and takes referrals from all the teaching units in St. John's.
- 3. McMorran Centre This unit also has an association with the Nurse Practitioner at the McMorran Centre. The physicians at the Ross Centre provide supportive back-up for the Nurse Practitioner with any patients who do not have a family doctor.
- 4. Care of Nursing Students The unit also has an association with the Centre for Nursing Studies and provides medical care for nursing students from outside St. John's who do not have a family doctor in the city.
- 5. Developmental Disabilities Clinic Dr. Kath Stringer and Denise Cahill Nurse Practitioner (NP) operate this consultative service in conjunction with the Janeway to help transition these patients into the adult Health Care System. Dr. Tzenov will also be starting to work in this clinic, having recently completed additional training in this area.

Looking forward we plan to continue to embrace the Patient Medical Home model with special attention to advanced clinical access principals, quality improvement projects and patient engagement. Goals in education are to maintain the high level of activity at the Ross Centre and to continue to accommodate as many learners as possible across all levels. With Dr. Tzenov joining the Family Centered Maternity Care Group, we anticipate boosting our obstetrical and pediatric patient population. The Ross Centre would also like to continue its community engagement as stated above and look for further opportunities in our area to be a resource for the eastern part of the city.

2016-2017 has proved to be another busy year for the clinic team! Dr. Avery lead the way by helping to shepherd the accreditation process and then having a baby (Alli)! We have been fortunate to have Dr. Allison Tenant look after Dr. Avery's patient's in her absence. Allie has been a great addition to our team.

Shea Heights Community Health Centre offers a unique clinical experience, including acupuncture, with a multi-disciplinary and inter-professional approach to health care in a rural atmosphere. Family physicians work with a public health nurse, a community health nurse, a social worker and a pharmacist, offering residents and medical students a real experience of teamwork and service to a community. Three of our team members (Drs. Duggan, Avery and Pendergast) are members of the Family Centered Maternity Care Group, so prenatal, post-partum and well-baby care are an important part of our practice. It is notable that three of the four faculty members also spent part of their residency training in Shea Heights!

Our Community Alliance partnership with the community and the school continues to grow. Both Dr. Lisa Bishop and Steve Darcy are non-voting members of the Community board and alternate attendance on a monthly basis. This representation allows the clinic to give input and get feedback from the community. A community member has also identified an interest in serving on the Patient Advisory Committee (PAC) which comprises all the Memorial Family Practice clinics. The team has been active trying to get the youth clinic off the ground over the winter of 2017. We have recently received a "Quick Start" award to help with setting up the IT portion of the Youth clinic. We are hopeful that these efforts will increase the number of youth who use our facility.

The Primary Healthcare Research Unit is a research and program evaluation unit based in the discipline of family medicine. The Centre for Rural Health Studies (CRHS) is a specialized unit operating within the PHRU that focuses on the provision of healthcare rural and remote areas. Four family medicine faculty members have their primary appointments with the PHRU and CRHS and several other family medicine faculty members collaborate as principal or co-investigators on research projects.

The eHealth Research Unit

The eHealth Research unit serves as a hub for research projects that involve the design and testing of emerging health communications technology in Newfoundland and Labrador. The unit works with physicians to develop concepts, test new technologies, and evaluate their effectiveness with the goal of creating communications tools that are ready to be implemented in our healthcare system. One family medicine faculty member has their primary appointment with the eHealth Research Unit and the unit is a resource for other family medicine faculty members interested in eHealth technologies.

Most of the research conducted by faculty members within the discipline of family medicine uses the resources of the PHRU and/or the eHealth Research Unit and is reported here.

Activities and Accomplishments

Education

Faculty members with appointments to and affiliations with the PHRU are heavily involved in education in the following areas:

Graduate Teaching: PHRU faculty members are actively engaged in teaching courses and providing thesis supervision for graduate students in the Department of Clinical Epidemiology, the Department of Geography, the division of Community Health and Humanities, and the Department of Computer Science.

Family Medicine Residency EBM teaching: This work has been led by Dr. Kris Aubrey-Bassler. Dr. Aubrey-Bassler oversees teaching in critical appraisal, Quality Improvement, and the Residents Project program. The critical appraisal curriculum for family medicine residents uses up-to-date teaching tools developed by the Centre for Evidence Based Medicine based at Oxford University.

Faculty Development: A formal program for all faculty members in "Writing for Publication" is on-going for the last several years. This has been organized by Dr. Shabnam Asghari of the PHRU, and Dr. Cheri Bethune and has incorporated presentations both by PHRU members and external researchers. Several family medicine faculty members have submitted successful grant applications for the first time following these sessions.

The 6for6 Project: This project is the latest and most ambitious faculty development project that the Discipline of Family Medicine has undertaken. It is led by Drs. Cheri Bethune and Shabnam Asghari. It was initially funded by the Dean of Medicine for three years and was renewed for an additional three years in 2016. Each year, six rural preceptors are chosen to participate in the program. The program involves travelling to St. John's six times for 2 days each over the period of one year. The purpose is to learn to develop a research question and proceed through the process of developing a methodology to answer it. The experts/mentors and resources at the university will be at their disposal to help them with their project. During each of the six visits there are formal teaching sessions as well as meetings and discussions with key people who can help the participants move their projects along. The third cohort of six physicians has recently graduated, and the fourth cohort started in the spring of 2017. One of the first 6 for 6 participants recently had a paper accepted, several papers from the organizing faculty have been published in a special highlight issue of Canadian Family Physician, and several other papers are currently being written.

Curriculum Development in Medical Geography: Dr. Shabnam Asghari has led this initiative for the Discipline of Family Medicine. Previously at Memorial, there was no course or program in place to provide students with knowledge of geographic information systems and health research. For faculty members with these

research interests, applicants for research assistant positions either had a strong background in GIS or epidemiology but not both. To address this gap, we established a team of researchers and educators who were interested in Health/Medical Geography. The team developed two courses on Medical Geography and is currently pursuing development of a graduate program in Medical Geography.

Community Engagement and Knowledge Translation

Primary Healthcare Partnership Forum: The PHRU organizes the Primary Healthcare Partnership Forum (PriFor), a scientific conference based on a call for abstracts for posters, oral, presentations, and workshops. This conference serves an important role in connecting Newfoundland and Labrador researchers to policy makers and researchers in this province and other parts of Canada. In June 2017, the PHRU hosted the ninth annual PriFor conference which included over 114 attendees from across Canada. This was the first year that PriFor was hosted on campus at the Bruneau Centre for Research and Innovation. It was also the first year that patients were actively involved in the conference, with a total of seven patients attending and presenting on their own research at the event.

Partnerships: Many of the projects run in the PHRU require active engagement from policy makers and health care professionals outside of the university. The largest collaborative effort in the past several years has been the SPOR Network in Primary and Integrated Health Care Innovations (PIHCI). Our local PIHCI network is known as the Primary Healthcare Research and Integration to Improve Health System Efficiency (PRIIME network). This network is led by Dr. Aubrey-Bassler as the Research lead with Dr. Kevin Chan as the clinical lead and Mr. Michael Harvey, Assistant Deputy Minister of Health and Community Services, as the policy lead. The network consists of researchers, clinicians, policymakers, and patients from across the province with a shared interest in improving our primary healthcare system. In January 2017, we received notice that funding for PRIIME would continue for another three years based on a successful review from its funders. This year, PRIIME has been actively engaging with patient groups at the university and sharing research knowledge through its Research Snapshot series. PRIIME also advertised two cross-jurisdictional funding opportunities unique to the SPOR PIHCI network, in which four projects involving researchers in Newfoundland and Labrador were successfully funded.

PHRU welcomes a new Faculty Member: This year, the PHRU advertised a new faculty appointment. After presentations from several interested candidates, Dr. Amanda Hall was awarded the position in May 2017. Dr. Hall specialises in exercise science. Her research interest lies in chronic pain management and using exercise as a treatment for persistent or recurring pain. Early in her career she focused on evaluating the effectiveness of different exercise programs to alleviate lower back pain and the influence of patient-provider relationships on patient outcomes. This research has allowed her to work with leading research groups in Australia, the Netherlands, and the United Kingdom. More recently, her research has focused on knowledge translation and getting research into clinical practice. She has been successful in receiving research fellowships with some of the leaders in knowledge translation and implementation science, such as the University of Oxford and the Cochrane Review Group – Effective Practice and Organization of Care. Together, her research has

lead her back home to Newfoundland and Labrador where she continues her work on chronic lower back pain with the PHRU and the Choosing Wisely NL initiative and serves as the academic lead for knowledge translation with the Newfoundland and Labrador Support for People and Patient-Oriented Research and Trails (NL-SUPPORT). Welcome home Amanda!

Research in Progress: The PHRU organizes a "Research in Progress" (RiP) seminar series open to all departments, disciplines and divisions. Each month it hosts a speaker on a research project at various stages of completion ranging from those at the earliest stages of conception to those approaching publication. This series has increased visibility in the university community, has led to important collaborations and has helped presenters to refine their projects using the advice of seminar attendees.

Social Media: In 2016, the PHRU launched a Twitter account to help connect with other researchers at the university, as well as nationally and internationally. Our Twitter account has been quite successful, gaining a following of 237 followers since November 2016. Follow us @MUN_PHRU to keep up-to-date on the latest in primary care research.

Research Funding
