A MESSAGE FROM THE ASSOCIATE DEAN OF UNDERGRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION ABOUT UNDERGRADUATE ELECTIVE EXPERIENCES



Clinical elective experiences are part of the Doctor of Medicine (MD) curriculum at all Canadian medical schools. The Committee on

Accreditation of Medical Schools (CACMS) accreditation standards require medical schools to arrange all elective experiences through a centralized process. For local electives, our learners apply for elective experiences outlined in our electives catalogue via the Undergraduate Undergraduate

Medical Education (UGME) Elective

& Selective Application form.

The visiting electives application process for all Canadian medical schools is supported via the Association of Faculties of Medicine of Canada (AFMC) Student Portal. All

this portal to request visiting elective experiences at any Canadian medical school. Each application must be vetted to determine whether applicants are in good standing at their medical school, have the appropriate immunizations and the core clerkship rotations relevant to the elective experience. All electives applications must be reviewed, arranged and approved by the UGME electives team. Through this process, UGME ensures learners have the appropriate malpractice insurance coverage, facilitates the learner's application for educational registration with the College of Physicians and Surgeons (CPSNL), coordinates orientation and training requirements of Newfoundland and Labrador Health Services (NLHS) and communicates important safety information through the provision of university policies and procedures.
