OPPORTUNITY

Society of Rural Physicians of Canada (SRPC)

SRPC has received funding to reimburse rural physicians, including specialists, who are interested in advanced skills training, enabling them to meet specific community needs and reducing the need for patient transport out of communities to receive these services.

Are you interested in advanced training?

The SRPC has received 36 trainee applications to date, and this national program will fund 166 physicians. The maximum funding available for each physician is \$35,000. If you are interested or know someone interested in being a trainee, the eligibility criteria are as follows:

- Rural physicians must have an active license to practice in Canada.
- Physicians must be SRPC members.
- Physicians must have practiced in a rural community for a minimum of six months in the past year.
- Physicians may be practicing in more than one rural community.
- Physicians will have a demonstrated commitment to rural practice and will be expected to provide services in a rural area after training. Physicians must indicate their intention to return to a rural community for at least six months.
- Residents are not eligible for funding.

What are the next steps? You will develop a training plan based on the needs of your community and find a preceptor!
