- Public policy to protect natural areas to mitigate and adapt to climate change, and its impact on human population health and wellbeing
- Sustainable transportation plans, examples, and strategies in NL and Canada.
- Quantifying greenhouse gas emissions in a range of contexts, including healthy system, social sectors, and at the community level
